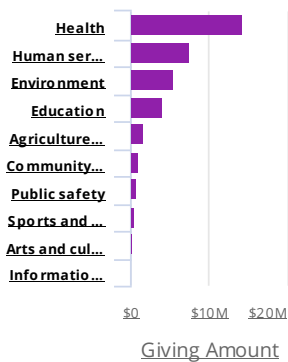


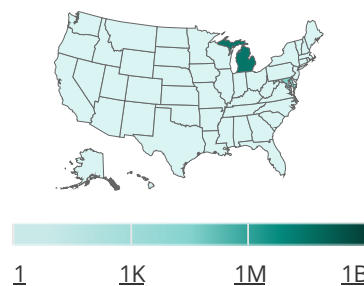

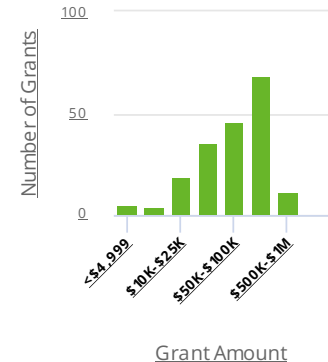
What Is Being Funded?

Purpose and Activities

The principal purpose and mission of the foundation is: 1) Children's Welfare including: health care facilities and programs, with special emphasis on the prevention and treatment of hearing impairment, and recreational, educational, and welfare programs especially for children who are disadvantaged for economic and/or health reasons; and 2) Preservation of natural areas, open space and historic buildings and areas having special natural beauty or significance

in maintaining America's heritage and historic ideals, through assistance to land trusts and land conservancies and directly related environmental educational programs.

Background

Established in 1961 in MI - Born in Germany, Bill Carls immigrated to the United States in 1924 at the age of 21. He became a citizen of the United States at the earliest opportunity. Utilizing his years of training and experience in European apprentice programs, he readily found employment with a series of major companies in the active Detroit industrial scene. Bill Carls started Numatics, Inc. in his garage in 1945. The company is headquartered in Highland, Michigan and remains a leading worldwide manufacturer of industrial air valves. Bill Carls became the sole owner in 1951, and was Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Numatics, Inc. until 1990 when, at the age of 87, he sold the Company to the corporation's management executives. In 1953 he patented a unique spool-and-sleeve pneumatic valve design. The air valve is used worldwide in manufacturing everything from automobiles, to textiles, to zippers. Bill Carls always shared credit for the success of Numatics with his first wife Marie. Bill and Marie settled in White Lake Township after their marriage, and lived there for more than 50 years. Marie Carls was an active employee of the Company from 1951 until just prior to her death in 1981. She assisted the business in many capacities and was respected and loved by her fellow employees. The William and Marie Carls Foundation was established in 1961 and was utilized by Bill and Marie Carls to implement their charitable activities. Until the time of her death, the activities of the foundation were the primary responsibility of Marie Carls and thereafter, Bill Carls took an active role the management until his death in 1995. The foundation shortened its name to The Carls Foundation in 1992

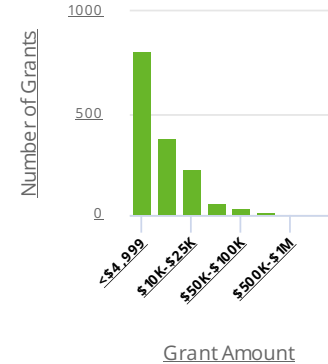

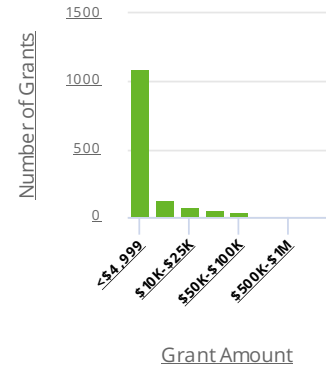

CEEPSACER Program

Through CEEPSACER, Consumers Energy Employees Providing Service Around Children's Essential Resources, the foundation supports America's Promise Alliance, where communities and partners help fulfill five promises for every young person in America: caring adults, safe places, a healthy start, marketable skills, and opportunities to serve. The foundation awards double Volunteer Investment Program (VIP) grants when volunteers and the nonprofit organizations provide at least two of the five promises on an ongoing basis.

Community and Civic Development

The foundation supports programs designed to strengthen local Michigan communities and economic development, with a focus on funding projects with long-term benefits. 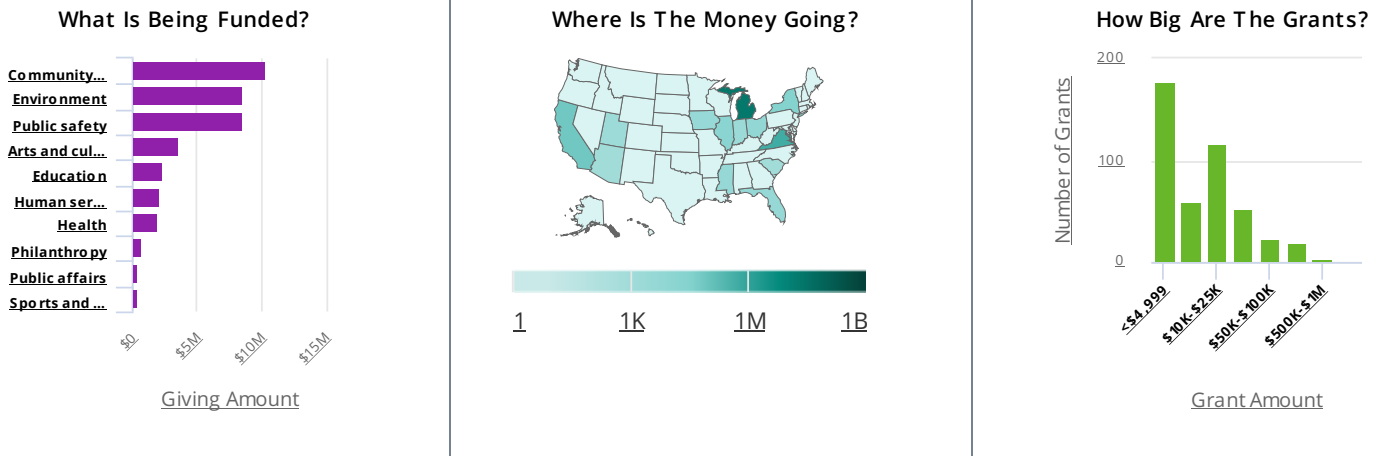

Purpose and Activities

The foundation serves the common good in Genesee County - building a strong community by engaging people in philanthropy and developing the community's permanent endowment - now and for generations to come. The foundation seeks to respond to current or emerging needs in the local area in conservation and the environment, arts and humanities, education, health and human services, and leadership development.

Background

Established in 1988 in MI

Program Areas (8)

Beautification and Historic Preservation

The foundation provides support to organizations designed to make the City of Flint a more physically and culturally attractive place in which to live.

Grants to Individuals Program

Scholarships to individuals from the Flint, MI, area for undergraduate education at American colleges and universities.

Health

The foundation seeks to address current health issues including maternal, infant and children's health, mental health, substance abuse, school health education, and speech therapy.

Mini-Grants Program

In order to ensure that resources are available for a broad spectrum of community organizations, the foundation sets aside funds for initiatives that are smaller in scope than those in the Community Leadership and Community Collaborations priorities. Proposals are generally funded in the \$500 - \$3,000 range, and priority is given to proposals that: 1) bring people who are typically separated by barriers (e.g., race, economic status, disability, age) together, creating a stronger sense of cohesion and inclusiveness within the community; 2) populations that have historically had challenges accessing resources, with particular consideration given to proposals that benefit people of color and children in poverty; and 3) support community-building events, particularly events that build a sense of community pride and identity.

Neighborhood Improvement

The foundation provides funding to emerging and established citizen-based organizations in low-income neighborhoods that are solving significant local problems, building alliances with other community institutions, and developing community-based leadership.

Scholarships

The foundation administers more than 60 scholarship funds established by donors to primarily benefit students across Genesee County, MI. Scholarships range from small one-time awards to larger multi-year awards. In most cases the scholarships are designated for graduates of particular high schools and typically provide partial support toward the full cost of higher education. Eligibility requirements, deadlines and application guidelines vary per fund. See web site for additional information.

Women and Girls

The foundation seeks to encourage the advancement and full participation of women and girls in society by promoting the removal of barriers to their economic, educational, physical, emotional, social, artistic, and personal growth.

Youth

The foundation supports charitable projects and programs that benefit youth in Genesee County.

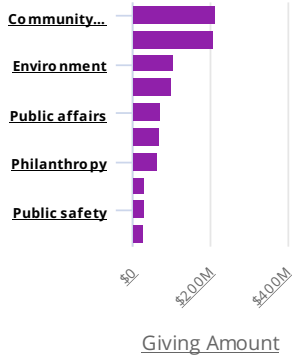

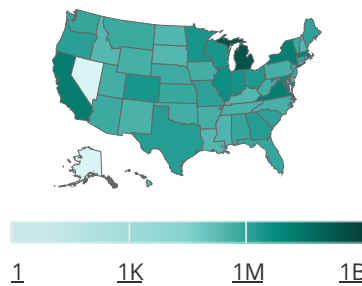

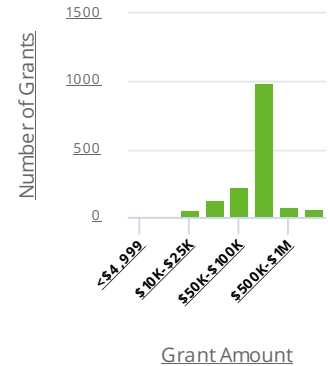
What Is Being Funded?

Purpose and Activities

To support efforts that promote a just, equitable and sustainable society with the primary focus on civil society, the environment, the area of Flint, MI and poverty. The foundation makes grants for a variety of purposes within these program areas including: philanthropy and voluntarism; assisting emerging civil societies in Central/Eastern Europe, Russia and South Africa; conservation of fresh water ecosystems in North America; reform of international finance and trade; improving the outcomes for children, youth and families at risk of persistent poverty; education and neighborhood and economic development. The foundation also makes grants to strengthen the capacity of local institutions in its home community of Flint, MI.

Background

Incorporated in 1926 in MI - Founded by the late automobile industry pioneer Charles Stewart Mott. Mott was one of the original partners in the creation of General Motors Corp., and served on the board of directors until 1973. In addition, he served as the mayor of Flint, Michigan, for two non-consecutive terms

Program Areas (6)

Civil Society

The mission of the program is to strengthen philanthropy and the nonprofit sector as vital vehicles for increasing civic engagement and improving communities and societies. The program is organized into four program areas: 1) Central/Eastern Europe and Russia; 2) South Africa; 3) United States; 4) Global Philanthropy and Nonprofit Sector. While grantmaking objectives and strategies are tailored to the specific circumstances of each geographic region in which the foundation works, two broad themes unite grantmaking within the program: to empower people and nonprofits to take collective action that promotes and defends democratic values; and to promote and develop a more robust culture of private giving for public good. Funding for unsolicited proposals is limited throughout the program. Those interested in applying for funding are strongly encouraged to submit letters of inquiry instead of a full proposal.

Environment

The mission of this program is to support the efforts of an engaged citizenry working to create accountable and responsive institutions, sound public policies, and appropriate models of development that protect the diversity and integrity of selected ecosystems in North America and around the world. The program is organized into three grantmaking areas: 1) Conservation of Freshwater Ecosystems; 2) International Finance for Sustainability; and 3) Special Initiatives. Funding for unsolicited proposals is limited throughout the program. Those interested in applying for funding are strongly encouraged to submit letters of inquiry instead of a full proposal.

Exploratory and Special Projects (XSP)

These grants support unusual or unique opportunities to address significant national and international problems. Under this program, including the program area for Historically Black Colleges and Universities, the foundation makes a limited number of small grants for projects falling outside its regular grantmaking programs. Proposals for XSP grants are by invitation only; unsolicited proposals are discouraged.

Flint Area

The mission of this program is to foster a well-functioning, connected community that is capable of meeting the economic, social and racial challenges ahead. The program is organized into four grantmaking areas: 1) Arts, culture and education; 2) Economic revitalization; 3) Strengthening community; and 4) Special initiatives. Funding for unsolicited proposals is limited throughout the program. Those interested in applying for funding are strongly encouraged to submit letters of inquiry instead of a full proposal.

Pathways Out of Poverty

The mission of this program is to identify, test and help sustain pathways out of poverty for low-income people and communities. The foundation believes education, economic participation and community engagement are critical to moving low-income Americans toward greater prosperity. These three areas are the pillars of the foundation's programs to address poverty in the U.S. The program is organized into four grantmaking areas: 1) Improving Community Education; 2) Expanding Economic Opportunity; 3) Building Organized Communities; and 4) Special Initiatives. The first three areas enable the foundation to support efforts to nurture systemic change in the educational, economic and community systems that produce and perpetuate poverty in the U.S. The fourth area allows the foundation to support projects that are crosscutting in nature and to explore special opportunities. The program also reflects the foundation's belief that racism contributes to, and shapes, poverty in the U.S. Thus, the foundation remains alert to opportunities to address institutional racism. Funding for unsolicited proposals is limited throughout the program. Those interested in applying for funding are strongly encouraged to submit letters of inquiry instead of a full proposal.

Program-Related Investment

The foundation has made PRIs in the form of loans to and equity investments in social service and community development organizations.

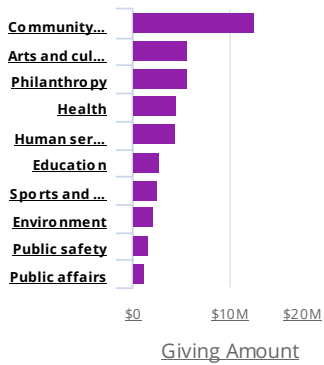

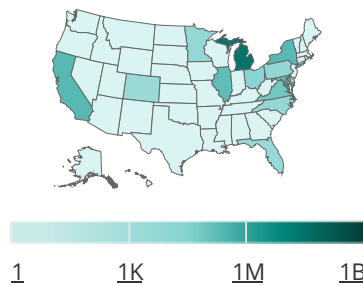

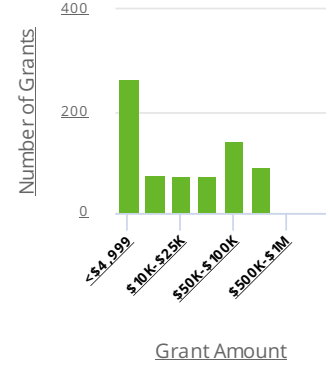

Purpose and Activities

The foundation's mission is to advocate, stimulate, and support community vitality. Its commitment is to base the foundation in its home community of Flint, Michigan.

Background

Established in 1989 in MI - The Ruth Mott Foundation established its grantmaking programs in January 2001 with four trustees and two staff members, and just two months later, rolled out its first docket of grants: \$1,291,014 was paid to 32 organizations. At the same time, Applewood, the historic estate of CS and Ruth Mott which is operated by the Foundation, is responsible for maintaining the home, grounds and outbuildings, and for coordinating public events on the property.

Program Areas (3)

Arts and Culture

The program focuses funding for arts and culture on community arts, which it identifies as community-driven programs, projects and activities that are led by skilled artists, engage local residents, address issues of local concern and reflect and honor local culture. It is especially interested in funding programs, projects and activities that: 1) support arts and culture learning; 2) promote or encourage positive community change; and 3) celebrate Flint's culture and heritage. The foundation defines arts and culture broadly to include all forms of arts and cultural expression .

Beautification

The foundation's beautification funding is dedicated to initiatives that help create safe, attractive and livable communities. 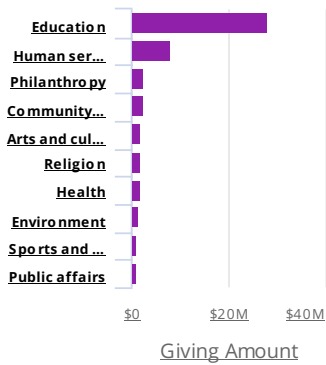

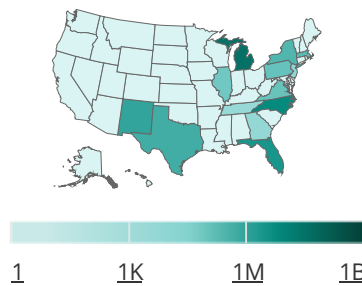

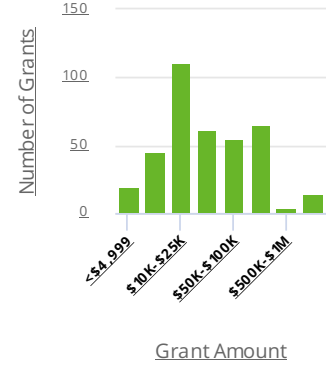
What Is Being Funded?

Community

The foundation engages in supporting events, programs, or strategic capital projects that help to support a vibrant community that will attract and retain residents and visitors alike. Typically, this focus area is a small percentage of the foundation's annual giving and is often initiated by the trustees. Priority for this funding in the following areas: 1) Neighborhood development/improvement programs - helping to make the community more livable and sustainable; 2) Employment or vocational assistance - helping people improve their ability to earn a living-wage; 3) Housing and shelters - providing a safe place to stay for families in need; and 4) Arts & cultural programs - providing experiences that further appreciation and exposure for arts and culture.

Wellness

With a focus on preventative health, the goal of this program area is to reduce obesity through the promotion of better nutrition and exercise. Priority for this funding in the following areas: 1) Youth centers, clubs and camps - providing opportunities for kids to learn important life skills in fun environments; and 2) Health & human service programs - providing quality care and treatment for individuals living within the local community that are most at-risk.
